Baptisms at Christmas

In December, I was invited by Pastor Latyr Diouf to celebrate Christmas with his family and worship with the parish of Mbokotour. "You'll preach on Christmas Eve?" he asked once I accepted. "Yes, I would be honored to preach on Christmas Eve," I said. "And will you come celebrate Christmas in Mbettite too?" "Yes, that would be great", was my enthusiastic response, knowing that Pastor Latyr is originally from Mbettite.

Around 11:30pm on Christmas Eve, we arrived in the village of Mbokotour. Once the generator started and the electricity came on, I could see that the chapel was as full as possible with people overflowing onto benches outside. I looked to the left of the altar area and saw, to my surprise, an abundance of babies and their parents in their finest outfits.

Everything soon became clear: Christmas is the time for baptizing babies in the Lutheran Church of Senegal. On Christmas Eve in Mbokotour, nine babies and one child were baptized. As they were instructed to let the light of Christ shine in them, the chapel, which had been illuminated with one light bulb, grew a bit brighter.

The next morning, I expected a small Christmas morning service. But our Senegalese sisters and brothers surprised me once again. Horse carts surrounded the church building. Women were streaming in in their finest clothes. And again, the front rows were filled with babies and their parents.

On Christmas morning in Mbettite, 21 babies and children were baptized in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. New sons and daughters of God, welcomed into God's family, on the day when the church celebrates the birth of Jesus, God's son with us. I love baptisms at Christmas!
